His poems have been published in numerous journals such as Crazyhorse, Prairie Schooner, POETRY, and the Birmingham Poetry Review. Ray is the Chair of the Division of Arts & Letters and the Chair of the Division of Humanities & Social Sciences, as well as a Professor of English at the University of South Carolina Sumter. Since 2018, Ray has been the Writer in Residence at the Columbia Museum of Art where among many things he

hosts the award-winning podcast Binder. In 2023, Ray received the Governor's Award for the Arts – the highest honor South Carolina gives in the arts.



Nicola Waldron (MFA)

Nicola Waldron is an award-winning writer of poetry and lyric prose, and a long-time teacher of literature, writing, and more recently yoga and meditation. Her work has been featured in many venues, most recently The New York Times, Creative Nonfiction, Los Angeles Review of Books, and several anthologies. Her essay "My Thick Waist" was chosen as a Best American Essays notable in 2015 and her poetry chapbook, Girl at the Watershed, was chosen by Kwame Dawes as a South Carolina Poetry Initiative competition winner and published in 2013.

She is the recipient of the U.K.'s Bridport Prize for poetry and the Broad River Prize for prose. A graduate of Cambridge University, the Bennington Writing Seminars, and Asheville Yoga Center's Advanced Yoga Studies program, she teaches writing at the University of South Carolina and 'yoga and word' out in the community.
